Ruth remembered all of us. And she was overwhelmed by the honor of the day. At 92 years of age, she remains a force of life. Conference Minister, Dave Moyer asked her at the last minute to offer some words of response. And she got up without hesitation and offered words of thanksgiving for all the years of ministry that she shared with her good husband Ralph.

She named every one of her children for us, including "the baby" her youngest son.

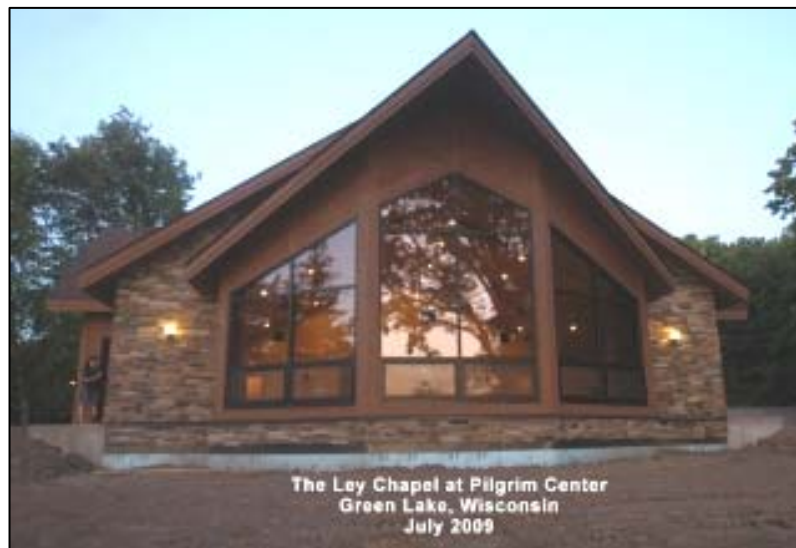
When I arrived in Wisconsin some 25 years ago, I almost immediately met Ralph Ley. He made sure of that. He had been retired for about 5 years but he was still active in the Health and Human Services committee. His passion was the nursing homes and hospitals and the youth homes (Fort Wayne and Sunburst). He knew that I had come from Chicago and asked if I would be willing to be the

representative to the Bensenville Home Society in Bensenville, Illinois. I immediately said, "Yes!" I served on that board for about 6 years.

Ralph became a kind of Godfather to me as he had to so many younger ministers in this conference. He was at the very founding of the United Church of Christ and he was a reminder of our history as well as a

marker of the future of the UCC. And Ruth was his true partner in that journey.

The chapel will stand as an honored reminder of a steadfast presence of a great ministerial team. Ruth and Ralph Ley will never be forgotten. Neither should they be.

“Just One... Can Be Enough”

How often has it been said, “What can one person do?” or “What can I do, I’m only one?” Several times over the last 18 months, Cynthia and I have taken guests to the winter home of Thomas Edison and Henry Ford, in Fort Myers, Florida. As we watch the video about the lives of these two ingenious men, and learn of the many inventions credited to them, we are awed by what they (each only one person) have done. Many inventions, along with medical, scientific, industrial, and technological discoveries have been accomplished by one person.

What can one person do? What can I do to make a difference in the lives of others? Two wonderful opportunities, in the Waukesha community, are offered for our participation and sponsorship.

On **Saturday, October 17th**, the annual **CROP WALK** will again take place at Frame Park. Last year, area walkers and sponsors contributed \$19,172.00. That is great! 25% of this total is given to a) Waukesha Food Pantry, where the number of needy families has increased significantly this past year; and b) the ministries of CCWC-Cooperation Congregations of Waukesha County for their seven ministries. The remaining 75% is for the important ministries of Church World Service.

Registration sheets for walkers are available at church. If you prefer, you may sponsor a walker from the E & R Church by signing their sheet. It is hoped that monies can be collected and turned in on the 17th.

Registration for the CROP walk begins at 9:30 am at the park and the walk itself at 10 am. The event begins with a brief talk about all the good CROP monies do locally and elsewhere, a prayer and big cheer.

The other opportunity...another way of answering the question, what can one person do, is the HOPE Dinner, annual fundraising event of CCWC.

The **HOPE Dinner** will be **Thursday, November 19th** at Country Springs, Pewaukee. The silent auction begins at 5 pm with the dinner at 7 pm. Individual tickets for the dinner are \$60, with about 50% being tax deductible. A table is 10 people, so let’s try and fill a table, which will have a sign identifying the E & R UCC.

If \$60 is beyond your ability, you may contribute to a basket sponsored by our Church. A basket is made up of items which carry out a theme: chocolate; snacks; wines; children’s clothes; sports; around the fireplace (popcorn, nuts, etc.). The value of a basket can vary, many are in the \$75-\$85 range.

With the down turn in the economy, the number of children participating in the CCWC meals program has increased 600%. There has also been a 180% increase in people coming to the Clothes Shop. \$72,000 has been available for various needs, but the amount requested has been \$500,000.00.

What can one church person do? We can fulfill the words of Jesus, when he taught us to feed the hungry, give a cup of water to the thirsty, clothe the naked. Then the powerful concluding words of Matthew 25:31-46, “as you did it to one of the least of these my children, you did it to me!” – Jesus.

Yes, there is much that one person can do!

A Note:

The role of the Minister of Visitation is to visit anyone in the hospital, those who are in a nursing home, and all who are homebound.

Sometimes I wonder.. is there anyone who has “fallen in the cracks” and should be visited? If you are aware of anyone whose health has changed and is no longer able to attend Sunday worship, please let me know. News from the R.O.C.K.

The R.O.C.K. is back in full swing with the start of our program year on Sunday, September 13th. With 19 children present and a full staff of workshop leaders and shepherds, we all began our current study on Rebekah and how she followed her faith in God to a new land and family, along the way showing hospitality to those sent

to her from God. Children have been creating miniature water jars to help remind them of the depth of Rebekah's kindness to Abraham's servant, talking about how to hospitable to others as they made mints which will be shared with the congregation on September 27 during the coffee hour, learning about wells, answering the question: just how much water does a camel drink as a way to understand the means in which Rebekah showed hospitality and researching Rebekah's family tree. All of the activities are providing the children an opportunity to learn more about Rebekah and the faith she had in God. The next rotation for the R.O.C.K. will begin on October 18th and focus on Jonah, who also was a follower of God, but probably a more reluctant one. While all of us know that Jonah got swallowed by a big, big fish, children will be looking beyond the fish incident and explore why Jonah responded to God's call in the ways that he did. They will also focus what Jonah's story can teach each of us about our own faith in God when things are not going the way we want them to go. This should provide a different perspective of what it means to be a follower of God. Children will explore Jonah's story through computers, games, and storytelling. Everyone will come together on the last Sunday of the rotation in November for a whole group activity using their senses to experience this fascinating, yet revealing story of God's faith in us.

Our three, four, and five year olds began their program year with a study of Joseph, focusing on how families love and forgive each other. They have learned about the coat that Joseph received from his father, the dream he had when he escaped from his brothers' wrath, how Joseph responded when he brothers had to come to him for help, and how the family was able to come back together and forgive each other. In October, they will learn more about the life of Moses, exploring his birth, his call from God and how he fulfilled that call by leading the people out of Egypt. Throughout the fall, these children will be exploring the Old Testament as they learn more about how God was ever present with Joseph, Moses, and the Hebrew people, helping them to see that God will always be present for each of them.

With the program year off to a good start, I am glad to see the children of our congregation back at church. Their joy and endless energy is always a lift to my spirit and I hope they are to you as well on Sunday mornings. AS many of you know, Gray Mare Pre-school is using space in our building this school year for their three year old program on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Their

Some of them are still getting use to being away from Mom for the first time and others are getting use to being a new building with different noises, but it has been good. If you come in the west door on Sunday mornings will see their information board that lets parents and our congregation know what they are doing. I am glad that we are offering our wonderful building for use to programs like Gray Mare as a way to reach out to our community and share the good that we have.

CROP Walk is coming up soon. October 17th to be exact and I want to encourage our families to consider walking and raising money for this worthwhile cause. CROP Walk has been around forever. For me, it brings back fond memories of walking with my sister and mother along the back roads of our small West Virginia town, laughing and enjoying the fall crisp air as we raised money to help those less fortunate around the world.
